

NEW TWISTS ON WINE

Drinking Merlot just got a whole lot easier. Companies like French Rabbit are rethinking the wine bottle, offering picnicworthy wines in snappy cardboard cartons. Let's also raise our glasses to bottles with twistoff caps. Besides preserving the cork oak tree (from which the materials for the typical bottle stopper come), twist-offs may actually retain freshness better than a cork and a seal without risk of "cork taint." While there's no official count, John Gillespie, the president of the Wine Market Council, guesstimates that 5 percent of wine bottles are now sealed with caps but "the numbers are growing" as hip brands (Bonny Doon Vin Gris de Cigare, \$11; PlumpJack Cabernet Sauvignon, \$160) and vineyards in entire regions (like those in New Zealand that produce white wines) are proudly doing the twist. So the next time you're offered a corkless bottle, don't dismiss it-enjoy it. The bonus: There's less pressure to polish it off in one sitting.
